

Her voice is clearly articulated in her publication of 2017, titled 'Time to look in the mirror: Producing management theory and knowledge for Africa', in the Africa Journal of Management. She stated: "The responsibility of scholars interested in management and organisations in Africa is to take up the complex challenges of producing management theory and knowledge for Africa. I argued that we have two major responsibilities." She also states that: One is to build a strong intellectual community association; and the second is to generate management theory and practice for the benefit of the continent".

This interview sheds light on how to think about and act on doing business research that can make a positive difference, by adding value to move forward and build a prosperous Africa.



The NWU Business School's Dr Piet Croucamp speaks to Prof Noëlle van der Waag-Cowling from Stellenbosch University.


